Part 1: 'Fresh Eyes' July 10-30th at City Hall

In an effort to celebrate and include new citizens, Arrivals.ca created an art installation entitled *Fresh Eyes*, a visual composition featuring the eyes of new Canadian citizens on City Hall. *Fresh Eyes* consisted of transparent photos applied to the windows of city councillors' offices that face onto Nathan Phillips Square, allowing our city officials to 'see through the eyes of a new citizen.' The title *Fresh Eyes* also references the value that new and diverse perspectives bring to debate and decision making situations. Over half of citizens, but less than 15% of elected officials are visible minorities in Toronto. Photographed by Che Kothari, the piece is over 100 metres long and 2.5 metres tall.

Part 2: 'Births, Deaths, Arrivals' in the Toronto Star

The individual stories of the new citizens were placed in the Arrivals Section of the Toronto Star, obits on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays during the month of July 2012. This pilot section featured stories and portraits within the context of Canada's shifting demographics. The piece worked towards a better representation of the voices of newcomers in the Canadian narrative and the value they bring to Canada as whole.

The *Fresh Eyes* art installation and the corresponding Arrivals section in the Toronto Star was the first commission of the TO2015 Arts and Culture Advisory Council and marked the three-year countdown to the start of the 2015 Pan Am/Parapan Am Games.

Project Overview

BeautifulCity.ca first introduced the idea of a tax on billboards to enhance public spaces via art during the 2001 Creative City Consultations. Work included policy development, multiple town halls, extensive public relations and coordinating an alliance of over 60 organizations. Membership included organizations ranging from the Art Gallery of Ontario, to the Elementary Teachers of Toronto.

The billboard tax and bylaw improving protection of public spaces passed Toronto City Council 2009. Between 2009 and 2010 the levy was directed to the art by City Council three times and over \$21 million dollars in revenue was put into an art reserve. With the conclusion of a lawsuit at the Supreme Court of Canada in 2013, new funding was phased in using the reserve, with the target of reaching \$25 per-capita. Effort has resulted in an increase to the Toronto Arts Council budget by over 60%.

'B.S. Brand Billboard Lobbyist Sanitizer'

In honour of over 80 meetings between billboard lobbyists and city councillors and the economic apocalypse that taxing billboards for art would cause, the Department of Political Hygiene distributed these special hand sanitizers within City Hall in conjunction with illegalsigns.ca. Photographs went twit-viral and the result was a cease-and-desist order as well as inclusion in features on Global Television and various other media outlets.

Housepaint Phase 2: Shelter at the ROM

Project Overview

This exhibition was a distillation of the spontaneity, spirit of collaboration, accessibility and social consciousness from which street art has emerged. Housepaint at the Institute for Contemporary Culture (ICC) at the ROM was the first exhibition of street art in a major Canadian museum, an open-ended exhibition and experiment. Through the run of the exhibition, every month-and-a-half another street artist was invited to respond and add to the canvas houses from Tent City and the previous art work in the sequence — layering the exhibition with meaning and building organic connections between the works.

The exhibition also included seven months of community programming, lectures, workshops and outreach to sustainable housing stakeholders. At the end of the exhibition, the canvas houses were auctioned for Habitat for Humanity Toronto.

Project Overview

Livingspace was a process driven exhibition rooted in an earnest attempt to reflect Regent Park – an oasis of diversity and Canada's pioneering social housing project. The soul of this process was ten-weeks of workshops and collaborations between artists and a group of local youth. This group of 'kids' humbled some of the most experienced programmers and street artists with their creative ability, passion for learning and the gravity they have generated at the core of this program. Around this dynamo, artists, documentarians, curators, local community leaders, historians and guest mentors had the opportunity to feed in their ideas, stories, and experiences and explain their creative modes. Some remained in a close orbit of exchange, others have flung off on wide trajectories – all have come away from the workshop sessions amazed, excited, refreshed and highly motivated. From Dan Bergerons's posters of watchful residents — to Kothari and Paterson's celebratory echoes of shared paths — to the five mural sites the audience encountered on a personalized tour — the works were bound by collaboration. The lines between individual works were blurred as photos shot by youth participants and mentors one day are repurposed in the next for murals and posters. Notes are turned to stencilled poems and abandoned doodles into giant splashes of colour. The physical application of these is filmed, pulled back into the projections and the process was amplified to pushing process and voice to the fore.







Project Overview

In July 2013, the Friends of the Pan Am Path, in collaboration with the City of Toronto received City Council endorsement for the Pan Am Path as a Host City Showcase Program of the Pan Am/Parapan Am 2015 Games. This included a commitment to create over 80 km of continuous trail across the city (construction continues into 2017.)

The Friends of the Pan Am Path aligned funding, partners and supporters into a city-wide collaboration of over 100 to develop the Pan Am Path Art Relay. From May 16 to August 15, 2015, the Pan Am Path came alive with a city-wide relay of art installations and events, celebrating Toronto's greatest assets: diversity, nature and arts. Fourteen separate zone events took place along the Path and featured public art installations, music, performances and family-friendly festivals.

Devon is a curator, artist and advocate with nearly two decades of field experience in creating projects that bridge sectors, cities and neighbourhoods. Typically involving large assemblages of organizations, collaborations include the 80 km long Pan Am Path, Arrivals Canada, Streetscape, Housepaint at the Royal Ontario Museum, Hype at the Art Gallery of Ontario, t.h.e.m., Ignite the Americas and a mural and research project at Kingston Penitentiary. A co-founder of Manifesto Festival, Devon was also a founder of Beautifulcity.ca, a successful campaign that put a levy on billboards to fund art in Toronto.

Devon co-taught Arts Advocacy at the University of Toronto, graduated from Nonprofit Management and HR Management programs at Ryerson and holds an MA in Curating from Goldsmiths. Currently, Devon is completing a part-time Masters of Public Administration at the London School of Economics.
